CHORAL VESPERS & HARVEST DINNER If you have ever sponsored school kits, THANK YOU!!! As a result of your generosity, Westminster Presbyterian Women (WPW) has already built and delivered more than 1,000 school kits!

For a number of years now, Westminster Presbyterian Women has assisted Church World Services (CWS) through the donation of school kits, which are then collected and distributed worldwide. School kits, newly reimagined as Kids Kits, one of the most asked for means of support, are distributed by CWS to school children following disasters, in need, and/or displaced for any number of reasons so that they might have the means to return to school as quickly as possible.

Until this year, each kit contained 3 spiral notebooks, 6 pencils, a pencil sharpener, a large eraser, a box of 24 crayons, a pair of scissors, and a 12" ruler, packed in a canvas bag. But this year they will contain just 1 spiral notebook, 6 pencils, a pencil sharpener, a large eraser, a box of 24 crayons, a pair of scissors, a 12" ruler, plus a box of 12 colored pencils, a pocket folder, a glue stick, and a pencil pouch, packed in a canvas bag.

Once again, we are preparing to build 150 kits that will be delivered to CWS in September. Over the past few years, MADD Camp campers built these kits, but this year, they decorated the bags that will be used to build them. Using a spray tie dye, they took plain canvas bags and brought color to them. This is a sampling of their work.

Although the name and contents have changed, kits are still valued at \$15 each. CWS also asks for an additional donation of \$2 per kit to cover transportation costs. However, because we buy school supplies during back-to-school sales, even with recent increases in prices and changes to the kit itself, we are still able to build kits and cover the cost of transportation for \$10 per kit.

The environment on the bus was still, with everyone keeping to themselves for the most part, but as soon as they reached their first stop—Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania—conversations began to bloom. They ate lunch in the Strip District, rode the Duquesne Incline for a panoramic view of the city, and then resumed the bus ride.

They stopped for the night in Columbia, Maryland, where they stayed for four nights as they journeyed to the surrounding areas. The first of these areas was the state capitol, Annapolis, where the group explored, ate lunch, and embarked on a harbor cruise.

Following this excursion, they prepared for and then performed their first concert of the trip at Christ Memorial Presbyterian Church in Columbia. The choir and bell ringers delighted their audience with pieces they had practiced for months. Without a doubt, their first concert was a success.

The remainder of the trip followed a similar pattern. Between concerts, the Knox Choir travelled to locations like Bethany Beach in Delaware and the National Zoo in Washington D.C. Their second concert took place at Christian Community Presbyterian Church in Bowie, Maryland, where they again successfully performed to an enchanted audience.

The following day, the Knox Choir visited the Missionary Air Group in Burlington, North Carolina. There, they received the opportunity to interact with functioning aircraft, and they learned much about missionary work around the globe.

In between rehearsals, ringers attended a variety of classes taught by handbell experts from across the country. The guest clinician for the Spring Ring was Fred Gramann. Fred spent 50 years in Paris as the director of music at the American Church in Paris. In addition, he is a composer and internationally known conductor, educator, and handbell clinician. It was a privilege and great joy to participate with so many other ringers in this event. This festival continues Westminster's long-time commitment to handbell ringing, a tradition that began in the 1960's under the direction of Bob Stofer.

Westminster Spirits Soar at Kirkmont Center

For over 60 years, Kirkmont Center, our Presbyterian-affiliated camp and conference center located in Zanesfield, Ohio, has been the source of much connection, spirituality, and joy for many in the Presbytery. However, changing times, busy family schedules, school and sport commitments, financial stresses, modern distractions, societal pressures, flagging church attendance, and not to mention a global pandemic have taken their toll on camps like Kirkmont Center. Many have even had to close their doors for lack of support and dwindling attendance. Contrary to the state of our world, the Presbyterian community, especially Westminster, is just built differently! Our church members are rediscovering their connection to God's creation—once again growing in faith, and re-igniting a passion for all things nature!

The tradition of summer camp that many remember fondly from their own childhoods as a pivotal step in their faith journey has suffered in this modern world. Thankfully, though, through the financial support of generous donors, the continued desire to offer this life-changing opportunity for children, sheer determination, and by the Grace of God, the light of faith continues to burn brightly at Kirkmont Center! Westminster children and families have returned in droves and are adding their own spark to keep that light going far into the future.

Members of Westminster were well represented at every one of Kirkmont's summer camp programs this year. At Beginner's Camp 1/3 of the registered campers came from Westminster families. Several WPC youth attended PYC and Camp Rejoice, and You & Me Camp alone had 17 Westminster members attending. In all, 40 members of our Westminster community attended a summer camp, special event, or community program at Kirkmont Center this year! This is an incredible turnout and testament to the love we hold for our camp on the mountain.

Even more incredible, overall camp attendance for Kirkmont Center was up nearly 15% in 2025—a sign that not only is Westminster rediscovering our love for Kirkmont, but the greater Presbyterian community has not forgotten their "Place for all People in All Seasons." Faith building and connection are alive and well, and Kirkmont is once again growing into the future!

Westminster members are also getting involved at Kirkmont in other ways. Beginner's Camp was co-directed by our own Abby Lachman, who did an amazing job working with Kirkmont's youngest campers. In addition, Westminster member Audrey Bonar served as Beginner's Camp nurse offering up a healthy dose of band-aids and hugs. Drew and Tori Statt served as the co-directors for Kirkmont's You & Me Camp, which focuses on enjoying camp together as a family. Additionally, Drew serves on Kirkmont's Board of Directors, ensuring the sustainability and success of Kirkmont's mission.

Even Westminster staff have done their part. For example, Pastor Caitlin Deyerle not only sent her girls to camp this year, but she attended camp herself as part of the You & Me Camp crew. Brent Manley, along with Duvier Perez from our sister church in Colombia, also volunteered time to do activities with Beginner's Camp. Additionally, Business Director Tim Francis facilitated the donation of our old Fellowship Hall tables to Kirkmont this past year. Many others in the Westminster community have also come out for volunteer workdays to clean and maintain Kirkmont, served as camp counselors, attended community events, and more!

If Kirkmont has not been on your mind in a while or you'd like to learn more, here is your long-overdue update on all things Kirkmont Center.

Last year Kirkmont partnered with the University of Virginia Astronomy Club to host the most amazing Eclipse Event in Ohio, as over 30 young astronomers and over a hundred fifty visitors came together to share knowledge, eclipse fun, and wonder together at God's great glory. Kirkmont also held its first annual Spring Into Nature 5K this past May, bringing runners and supporters from all over Ohio and beyond. Runners and walkers enjoyed one of the only single-loop 5k trail runs in Ohio, traversing much of Kirkmont's beautiful property. This event raised over \$4,000 for camp scholarships.

Working with the Ohio Nature Conservancy, Kirkmont conducted its first-ever large-scale study of its flora and fauna. The study revealed that Kirkmont's unique location among the highest points in Ohio and its pristine land, untouched and undeveloped for over 60 years, is home to a multitude of rare native trees, plants, and animals, including several endangered species. Armed with the study's findings, Kirkmont partnered with the Logan County Land Trust to add legal preservation status to the property with grants aimed at removing invasive species and setting aside over 300 acres for perpetual protection. This is Kirkmont land that is now forever legally protected from development, deforestation, and harm.

Through generous donations, Kirkmont has begun a multi-year project to update its aging facilities, including adding fire protection to Croft House and installing a brand-new well-pump and water treatment facility capable of servicing the whole camp. A major renovation of the Shelter House is underway, including a new roof, restroom facilities, and stonework. The Board of Directors is currently seeking grants to overhaul Goodrich Lodge, enhancing ADA accessibility and increasing the functionality of the space, and most excitingly, Kirkmont just completed architectural plans and will soon be breaking ground on the construction of a brand-new Miami Bathhouse.

Kirkmont is blooming again, and Westminster members have been right there to enjoy its beauty! Please consider giving the gift of camp by sending your child, grandchild, or by supporting our Westminster youth to attend camp next summer. Intergenerational Mission Trip

As we drove up to the worksite on the first day of our service, I was exhausted. Having not slept the night before, I did not feel ready for a full day of manual labor. These thoughts ran through my head as I got out of the car and walked to the door of Mrs. Patty Perry's home, who needed a new roof as hers was leaking and rotting in multiple places. She explained all this to us as we stood in the dewy grass on that first chilly morning. As she spoke of her struggles, I began to develop a sense of purpose and meaning for being there. God had put me in her life and her in mine for a reason. This cause was bigger than however many hours of sleep I had gotten the night before. As I began to realize this, we met the construction team we would be working with: Dustin, the head carpenter, Brandon, a younger carpenter who was only 19, and Suzie, who had also been a victim of natural disasters in the area and had sought help from the very organization for which she now worked.

I spent the next four days roofing, tearing up shingles, pulling out nails, laying felt, re-shingling, and many other arguably laborious tasks. They did not feel laborious, however. In fact, there was no point in the week when I wished desperately that I was not on a hot roof surrounded by tar and nails in the unrelenting onehundred-plus degree sun. Normally, a week like that would have been less than fun for me, but that week was immensely enjoyable. Sleeping on the floor and showering at the rec center went from unbearable to little inconveniences that faded into obscurity as the week went on. The reason for this was the realization of what our small group of teens and adults did that week in Hazard, Kentucky. We had contributed to the goodness of the world in our own way, with little to no regard for personal comfort or satisfaction. We had joined the good fight, the fight against harm and destruction through deeds that we did purely for the reason that it helped other people, which is immensely powerful and impactful in ways that I am only beginning to understand. So, if someone were to ask me if participating in the mission trip is worth their time, I would say, absolutely! Many people coming out and helping the world may not feel impactful in the moment, but the world is greatly impacted. And to those who already participate in the intergenerational mission trip, I say keep up the phenomenal work and continue to change the world in the most amazing ways.

Next summer, we look forward to celebrating the partnership between our sister churches as well as the partnership between the Presbytery of the Miami Valley and the Presbytery of the North Coast of Colombia in both Barranquilla and Dayton. The annual visits from our Colombian friends are just one of the ways that we support one another in ministry and mission.




